

DVI-D EDID Emulator Features...

The *DVI-D EDID Emulator* is designed to resolve DVI video display problems resulting from a temporary loss of Extended Display Identification Data (EDID) information. If a PC is booted or rebooted with the monitor disconnected, then the PC may auto re-configure the monitor to less than optimum performance. If a KVM Switch or KVM Extender is connected between the PC and monitor, then further EDID validation problems may arise.

EDID data transmitted between a host device (graphics card) and a monitor via DDC (Data Display Channel) is vital for a correctly formatted video display. EDID is a data structure provided by a video monitor to describe its characteristics to a graphics card, including video resolution, refresh rate and color depth.

Switching, extending or disconnecting and then reconnecting a video monitor may result in the temporary loss of the DDC EDID signal. The result is that the computer or host device is unable to pass a valid display signal to the monitor.

In 'learn' mode, the monitors EDID is memorized in the **DVI-D EDID Emulator**, thus preventing the possibility of blank screens and boot problems as well as resolving the issue of display resolution and color due to the lack of valid EDID information.
